

Sunday 21st March, Northern A's Run to Tocal Homestead






Wanderers Next Outing Wednesday 3rd March - Western Airport Experience



Amazing 1929 Model A Ford Journey

In the NRMA Open Road magazine of November/December 2020 there is a mention of an amazing journey into the Burragorang Valley in a new Model A Ford. The story appears together with a number of reader's letters in an article titled:

"Lost But Not Forgotten. In the 1950s, the Burragorang Valley slowly filled with water and disappeared. More than 60 years later, some readers still mourn its loss."



The article resonated with me as in 1948 a high school friend and I were silly enough to attempt to hike from the Burragorang Valley along the river up to the Megalong Valley. We did not have maps and had little experience in hiking in isolated areas. We travelled by train to Camden and then by bus to the Oaks and on to the guest house called 'The Knoll'

in the Valley. From here we set off and camped overnight. In the morning we had to admit that we were fools to go into that wilderness, So we packed up and went home. In about 1953 I returned to the same spot with friends in my new Morris Minor. This area in the valley would now be many metres under water. I can therefore appreciate the story about Reg Johnson, who was the NRMAs Open Road's photographer and explorer in the late 1920s. The Burragorang Valley was one of his favourite places to visit and in 1929 he drove a new Ford Model A up the valley to the Megalong Valley. This journey required him to make 16 river crossings.

Peter and Jenny Thompson's -1929 Model A Phaeton

Our 1929 Phaeton has been in the Thompson family since 1930 and came from St Mary's. My grandparents worked and lived on the family farm at what is now Kemps Creek. They had 4 children, Wallace, Elton, Keith my father and the youngest Esme. Until my Aunty Esme was born the family had a 1928 Model A Ford ute. My grandmother Ruby, who my phaeton is named after refused to ride in the ute with a new born baby. The ute was hastily swapped with the next neighbour for the phaeton.

The phaeton has spent most of her life in Western Sydney and Canberra. She had travelled 133,200 miles before she was put back on the road in 2003. Her original registration number was 210-444. Most of these miles were done from the farm at Mt Vernon, now kemps Creek to St Marys or a big day out drive to Liverpool. All the 4 children learnt drive on the phaeton. In 1948 my great grandmother passed on and the family farm was sold. My grandparents moved to 72 Jersey Rd South Wentworthville. The phaeton went with them and then did errands around Wentworthville and trips to Parramatta. In 1955 the phaeton's engine was tired and was rebuilt. The engine in 2000 was opened up to see what needed to be done. Everything was fine and only the gaskets and rings were replaced.

My grandmother then decided to buy a new car as my grandfather had passed away and she wanted a closed in car with wind up windows. The phaeton was replaced by a new 1955 Morris Oxford. My Uncle Wallace then bought the phaeton off my grandmother for 100 pounds. The phaeton was then driven to his home at 69 Limestone Ave Canberra. The War Memorial is just down the street. The phaeton was registered in the ACT. Her rego number was 11092. The phaeton was a daily drive to the Foreign Affairs Department in Canberra. After 5 years of driving the phaeton succumbed to a rego check defect. The phaeton had a cracked windscreen and a sloppy kingpin.

The phaeton was once again replaced by a new car, a 1960 FB Holden station wagon. The phaeton was then retired to a "lean to carport" in the back yard. She was visible from the street and over the years many a person came to my uncle with the possibility of a purchase. As more people approached him, he always said an "Emphatic no!" I think he enjoyed wrangling. The phaeton sat for 27 years in the lean to. Unfortunately, may Uncle Wallace in 1987 was diagnosed with terminal bowel cancer. My Uncle knew that I liked the Model A as I use to ask after it as a kid and told him I would buy it if he ever wanted to sell it. My uncle rang me and said that his 4 sons were not interested in the phaeton and was I still keen. **You bet I was!** The only condition was that I take the phaeton the following weekend. You have never seen move so quickly. My uncle didn't want anything for the phaeton as long as I restored it and kept it in the family.

The phaeton was bought home to Penrith and put in the shed. It wasn't long before the Model A Club tracked me down. Neville Jones and Gordon Brown came over with a membership form and offered to start the phaeton. The A hadn't gone in 27 years and fired straight up. Impressive! Its next outing was the All-Fords Day at Warrick Farm. The phaeton was put on display as an unrestored Model A. The phaeton was like bees to honey. People and the A club were all over it. My Dad was in his element as he told everyone who wanted to listen that he learnt to drive on the phaeton, then started her up. The phaeton purred like a kitten. The phaeton sat for another 4 years waiting. By this time being a school teacher, I had no car skills. In 1995 I took myself off to Granville TAFE with my brother-in-law to undertake a spray-painting course. The result was what I was looking for. I met Geoff Patman, Head of Paint Refinishing and Jeff Rudd, Head of Panel Beating at Wetherill Park. The phaeton was stripped, sand blasted, prepped and painted. Jeff Rudd did all the panel work and every panel was re-sprayed meticulously.

Geoff Patman suggested we change the phaeton's original colours from tan to Empire and Saxon Green. An outstanding choice. The dark green upholstery is the original colour. The phaeton was then put back together with the help of Des Fitzgerald from the Model A Club who I will be for ever grateful. I did give him a job as my general assistant at Ingleburn North P.S. Another master stroke by me, as he was brilliant at that also and lived close to the school and I could give him A parts to work on. My neighbours, Bob and Phil Mack worked on the engine and the wiring. Ian Carr Upholstery at Fairfield Heights did all the upholstery and soft top.

The phaeton finally became road worthy in 2003. She was awarded Restoration of the Year by the Model A Club in 2005. Rugby the phaeton is still a work in progress and continues to be tweaked and improved. Rugby now has now a synchronized gearbox and a Fred Motschall steering box. My lifelong friend Mark (I don't mind spending your money) Tait, who I also met at TAFE has taken Rugby to the next level and I thank him for his persistence.

We are only custodians of these marvellous cars and I am proud to be a third generation Model A owner. Peter and Jenny Thompson
